## Back by Popular Demand. Breakouts or Fake Outs? The Draft Recap.

As the Packers overall roster is still recovering from the disastrous 2015 draft, the Packers again had to place major draft assets into the cornerback position. Similar to last year, I have reviewed film on each of the Packers draft picks and will give you my impressions and where I see them fitting.

**ROUND 1: No. 18 overall: JAIRE ALEXANDER, CB**

**AGE: 21 HT: 5-10 1/4 WT: 196 40-yard dash: 4.38 College: Louisville**



Because of an excellent combine performance and his tape from his sophomore year, most teams saw Alexander as the second best corner in the draft. Despite being short, Alexander has long arms and plays with more physicality than one might expect for a player of his size. His 2017 tape is rather sporadic due to knee and wrist injuries and missed time. His best tape came from against Clemson his sophomore year who had Deshaun Watson (Texans QB 1st round choice) and Mike Williams (Chargers WR 1st round choice). Alexander had two interceptions and allowed only one reception to Williams, and Kaiser stopped looking his way completely. During his sophomore year, he showed great shadowing technique and the ability to stay with high level receivers either in the slot or outside. He did seem to lose concentration at times and give up plays he should not have; he also gave up six touchdowns which, for a high end corner prospect, is far too many. His size, quickness, and fluidity remind me a bit of Sam Shields, the rare smaller corner who can hold up outside. He also showed excellent punt return skills which could be a bonus.

**How he fits:** He is immediately expected to step into a starting role on the defense, either outside or in the slot.

**Ceiling:** Pro Bowl caliber cover corner who’s athleticism, fluidity, and competitiveness allow him to be successful in Mike Pettines new defense.

**Floor:** Injuries don’t allow him to stay on the field consistently enough to allow his skills to be an asset.

**ROUND 2:** No. 45 overall:  
**JOSH JACKSON, CB**  
**AGE:** 22 **HT:** 6-0 3/8 **WT:** 196  
**40-yard dash:** 4.56  
**College:** Iowa



A tall corner with long arms, who's speed on tape was better than his combine time of 4.56. His short shuttle of 3.95 and 40 inch vertical are both excellent. Any Wisconsin fan will remember Jackson, who accounted for all 14 of Iowa's points against UW (two pick sixes) and a forced fumble. While not the fluid athlete Alexander is, he is larger, more physical, and better suited to play pressman coverage. His tape is filled with big plays-he is the NCAA leader in interceptions (8) and passes defended (26), which show exceptional ball skills. His two best games of the year were against marquee teams Ohio State and Wisconsin, showing that the spotlight isn't too big for him. He is a willing tackler who showed consistent effort in run support. His footwork in pressman could use some work, as he will occasionally lunge and get off balance. This may be due to having played corner for 3 years. If his lack of make up speed proves to be too much at the next level, his size and ball skills could make him a candidate to move to free safety. I think Jackson has a lower ceiling than Alexander, but a higher floor.

**How he fits:** Like with Alexander, the Packers would like to plug Jackson in as a starter early as part of their revamped secondary.  
**Ceiling:** High level starter who eventually starts outside opposite King or Alexander. Or is moved to free safety and replaces Josh Jones.  
**Floor:** Nickel and dime corner, and core special teams player.

**ROUND 3:** No. 88 overall:  
**OREN BURKS, LB**  
**AGE:** 23 **HT:** 6-3 **WT:** 233  
**40-yard dash:** 4.59  
**College:** Vanderbilt



This is a very interesting pick-Burks started and played three different positions in the past three years at Vanderbilt. He started as a safety and then was moved to an outside linebacker safety hybrid role before completing his college career as an inside linebacker. He tested extremely well at the combine having one of the fastest 40 times of all linebackers, which caused his stock to rise late. His tape is messy and difficult to evaluate because of all the various positions he played so it's difficult to know what his responsibilities were. I did not think he looked great in coverage, especially for a converted safety. He does not do a good job using his hands to disengage from blockers. He flows well to the ball showing very good lateral speed and has made a lot of tackles for a bad team. Ultimately, his lack of size and physicality will prevent him from replacing a Martinez or Ryan as the starter in the base defense. I think this was reach pick in the third round, but I would have loved it in the late fourth or fifth round.

**How he fits:** Replaces Joe Thomas as the nickel linebacker.  
**Ceiling:** Nickel linebacker that grows into a more predominant role in the defense while being an important member of special team's coverage units.  
**Floor:** Practice squad or last man on the roster situation; his lack of football instincts get exposed at the next level.

**ROUND 4:** No. 133 overall:  
**J'MON MOORE, WR**  
**AGE:** 22 **HT:** 6-2 5/8 **WT:** 207  
**40-yard dash:** 4.49  
**College:** Missouri



Very good measurables and size for an outside wide receiver. Very productive in his junior and senior years with over 1,000 yards each season while averaging more than 16 yards per reception. Moore dropped down may draft boards after running a disastrous 4.6 sec 40 at the combine, but redeemed himself with a 4.49 at this proday, which is a closer match to the speed he showed on tape. His big plays often came from yards after catch, where speed and strength are on display. Drops in his junior year were an issue (12), but were not present his senior year. Missouri plays a spread offense so Moore's route tree is limited, and his routes are not as crisp as I would like to see. That being said, he has the physicality, body control, speed, and run after the catch ability to have a major impact should he improve on his craft as a receiver. I like this pick more than most; he reminds me a lot of Devante Adams coming out Fresno State. If he can clean up his route running and build a rapport with Rodgers I think Moore will be a steal in the fourth round.  
**How he fits:** Immediately competes with Allison and Clark for the third receiver behind Adams and Cobb.  
**Ceiling:** Productive number two receiver who takes pressure off of Adams on the other side.  
**Floor:** Can't beat out the incumbent's receiver core and ends up special teams gunner.

**ROUND 5:** No. 138 overall:  
**COLE MADISON, OL**  
**AGE:** 23 **HT:** 6-5 **WT:** 314  
**40-yard dash:** 5.33  
**College:** Washington State



Madison played in the Cougars spread high paced passing offense locking down the right tackle position for the past three seasons. He excelled in pass blocking, while showing some weakness in run blocking. Shows good bend at the knees and hips, plays hard to the whistle working to get to the second level, and has a little mean streak. Showed good feet but lacks ideal arm length for an NFL tackle, so at best would have to be a right tackle. The transition to guard will take the addition of a fair amount of strength, so will likely not be immediate, but gives him his highest probability for success. He showed great flexibility and willingness to learn playing tackle, guard, and center at the senior bowl. His technique looks pretty good overall, but he will occasionally reach which causes him to lose his center of gravity and be easily moved. His punch could stand to be stronger especially if he stays at tackle. I like this pick and think he will follow in the line of Josh Sitton and TJ Lang as good line players from the mid rounds.

**How He fits:** Immediately gives the Packers more offensive line depth at right guard, right tackle, and center.

**Ceiling:** Becomes Packers new starting guard after a season of getting stronger.

**Floor:** The pace of the Washington State offense covered his strength deficiencies making the move to guard a bust and too short armed to hold at tackle and washes out after a couple of seasons.

**ROUND 5:** No. 174 overall:  
**MARQUEZ**  
**VALDES-SCANTLING, WR**  
**AGE:** 23 **HT:** 6-5 **WT:** 209  
**40-yard dash:** 4.37  
**College:** South Florida



Elite height and speed for a wide receiver. Very thin body receiver who was used almost exclusively as a vertical threat in the USF offense. On tape he appears to be faster than quick, as his separation came while at top speed not in or out of route breaks. His route tree is even more limited than Moore's, and in my opinion is a less polished route runner. This, combined with the fact that he did not play special teams make this such a surprising pick to me, because I see his best shot at making the team is to be a fifth or sixth receiver and special teams stalwart.

**How he fits:** Receiver and special teams depth.

**Ceiling:** Replaces Jeff Janis as the Packers best gunner and sixth receiver.

**Floor:** Practice squad and cut in 2019.

**ROUND 5:** No. 172 overall:  
**JK SCOTT, PUNTER**  
**AGE:** 23 **HT:** 6-6 **WT:** 204  
**40-yard dash:** 4.83  
**College:** Alabama




The Packers evidently thought Justin Vogel was too inconsistent last year. Ron Zook wants exceptional hang time, and no punter in college did that better than Scott. If you watched the national Championship games in the last two years, you saw what a weapon Scott was any time Clemson and Alabama traded positions. Alabama always won the field position because of the distance and hang time of Scott's kicks. Scott also kicked off for the Tide and could take on this role for the Packers to help save an aging Mason Crosby's leg.

**How he fits:** Your immediate starter at punter.

**Ceiling:** High level starter at punter for the Packers for at least 4 years.

**Floor:** Success in college does not translate to the harsher climate of Green Bay; one and done with the Packers.

**ROUND 6:** No. 207 overall:  
**EQUANIMEOUS**  
**ST. BROWN, WR**  
**AGE:** 21 **HT:** 6-4 3/4 **WT:** 218  
**40-yard dash:** 4.48  
**College:** Notre Dame



Classic Green Bay value pick most had a fourth round grade on St. Brown, but when he slipped to the sixth, the Packers grabbed him despite having already taken two receivers. Unwillingness to play special teams and lack of effort at times last season at Notre Dame more than likely caused his drop. At nearly 6'5" and 220 lbs, St. Brown is a huge receiver with sub 4.5 speed. His best season at Notre Dame came with newly acquired Packers QB DeShone Kaiser two years ago when he looked like a potential late first round pick. This past season represented a considerable step back. Still, St. Brown has all the physical ability to be a successful NFL receiver. I don't see the same quickness out of the break as Moore or quite the same run after the catch, but he is larger with a huge catch radius making him a potential red zone target. If he brings his best attitude and effort and can develop a rapport with Rodgers, he has a chance to be a second or third receiver in a year or two. Option two: the Packers strength and nutritional staff put 30 lbs on St. Brown's large frame and they transition him to tight end.

**How he fits:** Receiver and special teams depth.

**Ceiling:** Productive number two receiver who takes pressure off of Adams on the other side.

**Floor:** Attitude overshadows athletic ability, practice squad year one, doesn't develop, and is done after 2019 camp.

**ROUND 7:** No. 239 overall:  
**HUNTER BRADLEY, LS**  
**AGE:** 23 **HT:** 6-3 **WT:** 240  
**College:** Mississippi State



We all have our breaking points and watching tape of a long snapper is it for me! From what I read he is the best long snapper available in the draft.

**How he fits:** The Packers new long snapper.

**Ceiling:** Solid long snapper who holds the position down for at least the next four years.

**Floor:** One and done with the Packers.

**ROUND 7:** No. 232 overall:  
**JAMES LOONEY, DE**  
**AGE:** 23 **HT:** 6-2 3/4 **WT:** 280  
**40-yard dash:** 4.89  
**College:** California



Was one of the most athletic of the defensive linemen in this years draft. He finished second in the 20-yard shuttle (4.37), third in the vertical jump (35.5), seventh in the 3-cone drill (7.32), tied for eighth in the broad jump (9'5"), 10th in the 40-yard dash (4.89), and tied for 10th in the bench (28 reps). His athleticism flashes in his tape as he often won battles with the offensive line based on his quickness off the snap. He gave great effort chasing down plays from behind and is always battling. His lack of bulk and lower body strength shows when larger, stronger offensive linemen got into his body, he was moved off the point of attack. If he can add strength to better hold up at the point of attack, he could be a nice rotational defensive line player. He reminds me a little of Mike Daniels coming out of Iowa-an undersized player who plays with great effort and quickness.

**How he fits:** Immediately gives the Packers an athletic defensive line player to train under Mike Pettine.

**Ceiling:** Starts next year after Wilkerson leaves as a backup getting stronger.

**Floor:** Lack of strength is too much to overcome. Practice squad year one doesn't develop, and is done after 2019 camp.

**ROUND 7:** No. 248 overall:  
**KENDALL DONNERSON, OLB**  
**AGE:** 22 **HT:** 6-2 **WT:** 248  
**College:**  
 Southeast Missouri St



This is a Hail Mary type pick for the Packers. Donnerson has elite athleticism for his size. At nearly 250 lbs, he posted a 4.48-second 40-yard dash, 40-inch vertical, 10-foot-11 broad jump and 7.03 three-cone. With that level of athleticism, you would expect Donnerson to dominate at the FCS level, but that just didn't happen. The tape just does not show the same dynamic athlete when he was in shorts. His technique is poor in nearly all aspects, he far too often gives up on plays when his initial rush move fails, and his effort on run plays is also inconsistent. To have a shot to make the Packers roster he will need to give max effort on special teams while learning the technique to be an edge rusher.

**How he fits:** Edge rusher project.

**Ceiling:** Special teams contributor and back up edge rusher.

**Floor:** One camp and done with the Packers.

# Flag Displaying Etiquette – Courtesy of The V.F.W.

Below are some helpful reminders regarding the flags that we display.

- Never allow the flag to touch the ground or any other object while on display.
- Salute the flag as it is hoisted and lowered, during the playing of the National Anthem and while saying the Pledge of Allegiance. Stand at attention with your right hand on your heart and your hat removed.
- Display the flag outdoors only between sunrise and sunset, unless illuminated by a spotlight.
- When displaying the flag indoors, always position it to the right of the speaker or staging area.
- To place a flag at half-staff, hoist it to the peak for an instant before lowering it to a halfway position.
